# Background

Patients with opioid dependence experience that dental treatment is slow, time consuming and done in the cheapest way possible. It is also difficult to establish a "close bond" with a dentist.

A short structured questionnaire, registred


- life-style: smoking, hygiene, drinks with sugar and sweets
- oral health related symptoms

A cross-sectional study

## Setting

Opioid maintenance treatment (OMT) outpatient clinics



#### **Participants**

Time period Dec 2017 - Feb 2018

Inclusion criteria Patients in OMT clinics

Included 162 participants

ain factors that contribute to dental problems are: lifestyle (drugs, smoking, sugar) and psychological.
